Nowhere to Go But Up

July is a month filled with time off, independence celebrations, and preparations for the fast-approaching school year.

As I write this, I am preparing to go to Poland with the Celebrant Singers. I covet your prayers and ask that you help us by supporting us in prayer that God would open the pathways of people's minds and spirits to hear the message of hope through music and testimony, caring and prayer.

We experienced a marvelous June! We transformed the Fellowship Hall of Grand Avenue into our HayDay VBS farm. At HayDay VBS we learned that our Lord Jesus has made us friends of God! Jesus will always love us. He is our friend!

On a more somber note, the Supreme Court overruled Roe v Wade which established a constitutional right based on the 14th amendment to legalize abortion in 1973.

I was twelve when this occurred. I remember My mother said to me, "Why is it easier to decide who dies than who lives?" Mom was a devout Catholic, fiercely pro-life, but also fiercely pro-women's rights and pro-vulnerable people rights.

Many people like my mother believed that abortion was wrong. Many people like my mom believed that while it's wrong it's better to

have safe, legal, and rare abortions, than illegal, dangerous, common ones.

There are probably many in this church who which staunchly defend either side of the continuum. I'm not extolling the virtues or evils of abortion. I do want to reveal this opportunity the evil one is using to fragment us.

In the Book of Genesis, it says that the descendants of Noah built a great city in the land of Shinar. They built a tower "with its top in the heavens" to "make a name" for themselves. God was offended by the hubris of humanity and said:

Look, they are one people, and they have all one language; and this is only the beginning of what they will do; nothing that they propose to do will now be impossible for them. Come, let us go down, and confuse their language there, so that they will not understand one another's speech.

The text does not say that God destroyed the tower, but in many retellings of the story he does, so let's hold that image in our minds: people wandering amid the ruins, unable to communicate, condemned to mutual incomprehension.

Babel is what is happening to us throughout this decade but particularly at this moment. We

have become disoriented, unable to speak the same language or recognize the same truth. We are cut off from one another and from the past.

Babel is a metaphor for what some forms of social media have done to nearly all the groups and institutions most important to the country's future—and to us as a church.

There are many reasons for this: technology, theological drift, the hardening viewpoints formed around extreme emotions that solidify near the extreme ends of the spectrum, and the expectation that a political system and the right political leader will set everything right.

This is simply another version of the people of Babel who wanted to make a name for themselves. As the Church of Jesus Christ, we must simply seek to do better and call out better practices from each of us.

We have shown the same signs of such fragmentation. I'm just as guilty of spending too much time on social media and outlying the boundaries of what it would take to make a name for myself.

Grand Ave even held a straw vote to gain clarity on what is the will of the body concerning our denominational relationship, resulting in an inconclusive vote.

Last month, we were blessed to have a wonderful Vacation Bible School program put on by Melody and some great volunteers. The opening day of the program produced an atmosphere inside the Fellowship Hall that was immersive, with walls covered in farm decorations, fun music flowing through the speakers, and volunteers excited to see the children. When I walked through the barn doors into the Fellowship Hall carrying Presleigh, her eyes lit up and I knew she was beyond curious of what is going on. At first, she was shy, staying close to dad, not really engaging with anyone. But on day two, with the same excited atmosphere and fun activities, she was up and running. At one point in the program, confetti made its way into the audience, flying from buckets tossed in the air and floating down upon the children. This intrigued my daughter, causing her to run straight towards the little pieces of fun she saw laying on the ground. I sat back and waited for the fall, which usually happens when she's running with all she's got.

My daughter tends to fall on the ground quite often like many seventeen months old do. This used to cause me great concern being a new father and not having a clue to how this dad stuff works. When she first started walking and falling, I was quick to pick her up and make sure she was ok. Then she would be off walking and falling again, over, and over. Now that she's been walking for many months, the walking has turned to running and the falling is more accurately described as a crash onto the floor. And when this happens, of course I want to do all I can to help her up,

dust her off, reassure her that she is doing great, and release her back to her adventure.

As Presleigh finally made it to the confetti, I expected her to come crashing down to the ground, but something else happened. A young girl participating in the program reached out and embraced my daughter, as if to make sure she didn't fall. This young girl showed kindness and gentleness, with a smile and open arms to welcome her into the group of children. I sat back and watched as Presleigh smiled back at the girl, not really understanding the invitation, and grabbed a handful of confetti, and tossed it into the air smiling and laughing.

As I watched this short interaction between my daughter and this other young girl, it reminded me of how precious it is to have people in our lives that offer that helping hand when we're

about to fall, whether that fall is physical, spiritual, or even mental. A gesture of kindness and gentleness goes a long way in showing compassion to those around us. And there will always be times in our lives where we will need kindness and gentleness and a helping hand, and as believers in Jesus, it should be a way of life for us.

Sometimes I am not as kind or gentle as I should be, and I need a reminder to slow down and remember who I am in Christ Jesus. This young girl who made the effort on her own without any prompting to help my daughter was the example I needed. Thank you little one for being a beautiful example to all of us adults who at times forget that the small gestures of kindness and gentleness reap beautiful rewards for all who experience the act. So how about we do life together? We pray more and log onto social media less. How about we deeply and slowly, meditatively, and prayerfully read the Bible? I think Jesus would support that, would we?

We have a chance on Wednesday, July 6 at 5:30 p.m. to do exactly this - spend some time together, share a meal, and play Bunco, a game that allows us to meet one another for an evening. I hope you will join us. I hope you will plan to come because you see the larger purpose, the higher calling, the integration that we desperately need.

We can rebuild, but we must do so with the knowledge that we do not build to make a name for ourselves but for a place that the glory of the Lord might regularly dwell and inhabit. Let's get to work!

Next came, Moo-sic and More with Pastor Tom. He led the children in some beautiful praise songs. Sunflower Sam visited and needed a heap of help from Pastor Tom. Thank goodness that Tom knew how to help him. Adam Garrett played the part of Sunflower Sam, a farmer that had no clue about how to farm.

Ann White, then, took the children to Bible Adventures. She took them on a wonderful adventure in the life of Zacchaeus. We were able to stand on the street and block Zacchaeus from having a view of the street. Then, we saw Zacchaeus in the tree looking for Jesus. Wyatt Burkhart played the part of Zacchaeus. We also learned that Jesus will always love us, no matter what. Just like He loved Zacchaeus.

After this, on the first day, came Hog Wild Games with Dave Hammelmann. They had to wash the pigs. Some balloons (pigs) had shaving cream on them and were attached to one end of a table. The children were at the other end of the table and had squirt bottles that they had to wash the pigs with. They also had a water balloon relay game. They had so much fun getting wet.

On Day 2, the parachutes came out. The children were supposed to keep the balls on the parachutes but I think they thought they were supposed to keep the balls off of the parachutes. Clearly, this game was a hit. They loved it. Next came another relay race with dollies and horse racing.

We, also, had an exciting presentation by Carl Ross. He brought some farm equipment that was about 150 years old. He showed us how farmers used to use this equipment. All the machines helped farmers process corn. One machine cut corn stalks into wafers for food for the cows.

Another machine processed corn into chicken feed. The third machine took a corn on the cob and removed the corn from it. The children had so much fun participating in this presentation.

After the fall on my hip a couple of weeks ago, I received an e-card with the picture of a puppy and three puppy commands to follow: 1) “Sit!” 2) “Stay!” and 3) “Heal!” instead of “Heel!” Very cute!

Unfortunately, I landed on the same hip that had been fractured in 2017 and repaired surgically. Although it was painful, my fall did not result in another fracture or in any broken screws, thankfully.

In an endeavor to follow those three commands, I’ve been trying to take it easy. But now that I’ve been able to trade the walker for a cane, it’s tempting to “overdo!” There was a good opportunity to sit outside one morning, however when Al had arranged for a landscaping firm to deliver a truckload of bark to our property.

He and I had talked about this project the night before and decided that it would be good for me to supervise the workers in the backyard, while he took on the oversight of the whole operation. We were concerned that they might not see some of the smaller shrubs. However, as it turned out, they were very careful. My being there wasn’t really necessary.

Sitting outside with the sun warming my face was most pleasant. It wasn’t exactly quiet, due to the fleet of trucks coming by for trash pickup, recycling and yard waste. But, in spite of the groaning and grinding of the trucks, the sounds of bird songs could be heard.

While waiting, I looked around at the ever-evolving landscape of our small lot.

Wedged between the white rain gutter and the brick wall of the house, a robin’s nest caught my eye. Long strands of dried grass poked out from the nest, which had been abandoned quite some time ago.

We had watched with interest as a robin pair built the nest early in the spring. The female had abandoned it though without her eggs hatching, as far as we knew. What had happened? Maybe we scared her when we began planting the vegetables in the garden bed nearby. After all of that work, it was too bad that she was not able to raise a family there.

When she was sitting on the nest, the male robin would often call to her from a perch on the edge of the birdbath, also known as “Teddy’s water bowl!” Our late golden retriever could easily reach it and seemed to prefer it to his own water dish.

Oftentimes he would lie down nearby and guard the birdbath, chasing off any little birds that

might try to come down for a drink.

After Teddy had passed away, the birds began using it again regularly. One day I happened to look outside in time to see both robins bathing. The female had left her nest and was chirping loudly to her mate, who dunked himself in the water several times, flapping his wings and spraying it everywhere.

They both seemed quite joyful to have a bath, especially after a few days of warm, dry weather. I imagine that it felt good to her especially, after spending so many hours confined to the nest. There was barely enough room for her to turn around let alone escape the rays of the sun.

Finally, after a couple of hours of “supervising,” the project of spreading out the bark was nearly completed. I left my post and went into the house for breakfast. It had been a nice morning of “sitting and staying,” observing and reflecting... a healing morning for sure.

Just as a time of quiet reflection certainly can help with the healing process, it also creates an opportunity to connect with God, who understands our struggles. When we draw near to Him, we’ll discover that He has been with us all along. It just takes time to sit and stay in His presence in order to heal! God is good!
