

Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak

James 1:19

As a shepherd of God's people, as a Christian, and as a curious human being, I have tried to listen. I have tried to understand. I have tried to take that understanding and implement something based on my newfound understanding.

The Orthodox Church calls the first Sunday of Lent "Humility Sunday." The lectionary text is the parable of the Pharisee in the tax collector found in Luke 18:9-14.

We wish to emulate the tax collector in that we are humble before God and realistic about our sinful shortcomings and need for God's grace in all things. However, a second equivalent emphasis Orthodox devotion includes is to not emulate the Pharisee in the form of vigilance against false humility. "It is better not to fast and be humble, than to fast and be proud," wrote one Orthodox commentator.

For me, this means that I am a pastor only by calling but not because of merit or anything that would equate with being higher, better, more deserving, holy, sanctified, accepted, saintly, or any other qualitative status with God.

I am just like you - more broken than I can imagine, yet more loved than I can dream! Lent in many

ways is an announcement of a corporate quest for humility. This journey always starts with true repentance and represents the root and strength of the Lenten effort.

Let us flee the proud speech the Pharisee and learn humility of the tax collector. "Open to me, O Giver of life, the gates of repentance."

Our sermon series during Lent will examine the many faces of sin and try to answer the question, "What is wrong with us, the human race?" While it is sin, our attempt is to be more practical to find the balance between sanctifying humility and transforming confidence and boldness.


We can liken the journey toward Easter as a hike up the mountain. As we approach the summit the incline increases and the exertion intensifies. Our distance becomes shorter and anticipation greater.

During my years of elementary and junior high school, I had a good buddy by the name of Jesse. We met in kindergarten and formed a lasting relationship through our time together in school. Jesse was always kind to me and those around him. He was quick to laugh and eager to let everyone join in the fun at recess. Jesse was easy to like, and I enjoyed spending time with him.

There was one interesting thing about Jesse that occurred once a year; he would show up to school with a black marking on his forehead. Sometimes the marking looked like a small cross, other times the marking looked like a dark smudge that Jesse forgot to wash off his face. I don't recall other students in our class with that type of marking, so that made me curious as to why he had it and the rest of us didn't. So, I was determined to find out.

After a few years of witnessing Jesse show up to school with a dark mark on his forehead, I finally had the courage to ask him why he had the marking when the rest of us didn't. During recess after lunch, Jesse explained to me that he had the marking because it was Ash Wednesday. I had no idea what he was talking about. I had never heard of this special day. He went on to share with me that the mark helps him to remember the wrong he has done and all the good that God has done for him. I thought that was pretty cool. I knew about God and Jesus from a young age, and hearing Jesse talk about the mark on his forehead made me want one.

After our conversation ended and we went back to playing marbles, Jesse suddenly remembered something that he thought was very important. He shared with me that he's also not going to eat any sugar until Easter. I looked at him like he was a crazy person. He went on to explain that it was important that starting the day you get your ashes you should give something up that you really like and replace it with something that helps you get closer to God.

This simple, yet profound conversation I had with my friend at such a young age has stayed with me all these years. I believe God was using Jesse to plant seeds of faith within me, even though we were so young. As I grew older, whenever I would see a person with a dark mark on their forehead, I would be reminded about what Jesse shared with me and would recognize that person as a believer in Jesus.

I am thankful for my conversation during elementary school that created within me a desire to know more about Days OF LENT

Christianity and the practices people of the faith participate in. Being a Christian myself, Ash Wednesday and the Lenten season has become an important time for me. I look forward to the time of introspection and self-examination, understanding that I am flawed, yet God's grace is abundant through Jesus. Each year I participate in this practice I grow closer to God, which I am grateful for.

Do you have an Ash Wednesday or Lenten story? If you don't, this year is a great time to begin your participation in this special time in your Christian Journey and you may even develop a special story you can share with others. I encourage each of you to allow yourself to become fully open to the work of God in your heart during the Lenten season. You will be blessed and grow in beautiful ways as you say no to self and yes to God.

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Passing Along a Blessing

"This is how you are to bless the Israelites. Say to them: 'The Lord bless you and keep you; the Lord make his face shine upon you and be gracious to you; the Lord turn his face toward you and give you peace.' So they (the priests) will put my name on the Israelites and I will bless them." Numbers 6:24-25 NIV

Several days ago, I emailed all of the members of our small group asking about the titles of their favorite hymns or worship songs. A friend who is a gifted vocalist and pianist had offered to tape some songs to use at our zoom meetings on Saturday mornings.

Many folks responded with their favorites including familiar hymns such as "How Great Thou Art" and "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." A praise song performed by Kari Jobe called "The Blessing" was also requested. Al and I had heard it sung a few times in our contemporary worship service—a powerful song with words taken from the Old Testament book of Numbers.

In Numbers 6:24-26, Moses was instructed to teach the priests this blessing and they in turn were to invoke it over the people of Israel from one generation to the next. Thus, the Israelites would identify themselves as God's people, beloved and blessed with His protection, presence, grace and peace.

Through the centuries this particular prayer of blessing became a regular part of worship, not only for the Jews but also for Christians. It is still often used today, being read or sung as a benediction at the end of the service. I'm sure that most of us would recognize the traditional melody to the words: "May the Lord bless you and keep you; the Lord lift His countenance upon you, and give you peace, and give you peace,..."

Not only had I read that same passage earlier in the week, it also came up again twice on Sunday morning in two different contemporary services. Well, that caught my attention! I had to stop and ask myself, "Okay, what is the Lord trying to tell me? Is this what He wants me to write about this week?" So, I waited, prayed and read all of the scriptures related to blessings, until I felt sure that He was guiding me in using the verses from Numbers 6.

But here is where things took an unexpected turn. While looking at an email account that Al and I seldom use, I realized that besides quarantine reports and junk mail, it contained two personal letters that had been sitting unread for almost a year.

We normally read our emails daily, but from another account. Unfortunately, the account set up in my name had been neglected. One of the email letters was written in February 2021 by a man claiming to be my third cousin who had found my name with the help of an online genealogy tracker.

It was amazing to stumble across his email. Third cousins? That meant we shared the same great-great grandfather! He had carefully traced the family tree from that ancestor, but was wanting stories and old photographs from my branch of the "tree."

He also wondered why my ancestors moved from the family home in Hannibal, Missouri to northern California, a question that set me on a search through the scanty records that I had obtained previously.

Robert and I have been corresponding back and forth. Unpacking some of the boxes of old family photos stored down in the basement has been brought back many happy memories. Even though he is a third cousin, I can definitely see a family resemblance in Robert's smiling face.

Each of the people who have come before us have made a contribution in forming us, in determining who we are today. While it is amazing to think about all of the ways the Lord has blessed us from one generation to the next, just consider the blessings He has showered upon us through His Son, Jesus Christ.

Through faith in Jesus, we have become part of His family, bearing the name "Christian." Our sins have been forgiven; we have been spiritually reborn and are looking forward to the day when we will be with Him in heaven forever.

Indeed, the Lord has blessed us and has made His face shine upon us. May His blessing be passed along to future generations, so that it might become a reality in their lives as well. Amen!


